(i) provisions excluding jurisdiction of civil courts should receive strict construction. (See Bhagwat Singh v. State of Rajasthan: AIR 1964 SC 444; Raichand v. Union of India: AIR 1964 SC 1268), and

(ii) provisions conferring jurisdiction on authorities and tribunals other than civil courts (See Kasturi and Sons v. Salivateswaran: AIR 1958 SC 507; <u>Upper Doab Sugar Mills v. Shahdara (Delhi) Saharanpur Light Railway</u>: AIR 1963 SC 217) have to be strictly construed.
